DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH IN NASSAU COUNTY AWARDED HEALTHY BRAIN INITIATIVE GRANT TO ADDRESS COGNITIVE HEALTH AND DEMENTIA IN/FOR NASSAU COUNTY

Fernandina Beach, September 24, 2021 — Florida Department of Health in Nassau County (DOH-Nassau) announced it has been selected by the Alzheimer's Association and the National Association of County and City Health Officials (NACCHO) as a grantee for the Healthy Brain Initiative (HBI) Road Map Strategists. The grant will allow DOH - Nassau to enhance its capacity to address cognitive health and dementia for the citizens of Nassau County, FL.

"Public Health has pivoted to effectively intervene across our residents' lifespan to protect, promote, & improve their health, through integrated state, county, & community efforts. Funding from the NACCHO and the Alzheimer's Association for the implementation of our HBI Road Map "Forget Me Not Nassau!" will be key in strengthening Nassau County's capacity to expand the public health sector's reach. That includes expanding our "surveillance lens" and actions addressing the needs of our population living with or at risk for Alzheimer's disease and related dementias, while also helping promote quality of life for their caregivers." – Prince Danso-Odei, MD, DrPH, MPH, Administrator and Health Officer.

Through the grant, the department will designate a part-time HBI Road Map Strategist, a public health official working in support and coordination with public health partners across the community. The new Road Map Strategist will conduct a public health needs assessment, train local health officials and key community partners, and lead implementation of public health action on dementia, consistent with the State and Local Public Health Partnerships to Address Dementia: The 2018-2023 Road Map.

"It is exciting and encouraging to see two Florida county health departments further their commitment to the community by becoming Healthy Brain Initiative strategists in this inaugural cohort program.
