2023 Impact Highlights

- 6271 Volunteer Hours from Master Gardener Volunteers and 4-H Youth Development Volunteers.
- Five communities adopted Florida-Friendly Landscaping Program language into their codes/covenants/restrictions.
- Estimated 3,554,738 gallons of water saved (a \$10,558 value), as a result of adopting landscape best management practices.
- 7,380 youth who demonstrated behavior change in subject matter.
- 125 agricultural clients adopted one or more agricultural BMPs to improve soil health and reduce irrigation, pesticides, and fertilizer requirements - an economic and environmental impact.
- Volunteer Income Tax Assitance (VITA) saved residents \$33,000 in filing fees.
- Medicare program provided a \$50,000 consultation value and \$10,000 in prescription drug cost savings.
